Together for a green, democratic and resilient Europe

The EEA Agreement is the mainstay of Norway's cooperation with the EU and the EU member states. The Agreement sets out a common goal to work together to reduce social and economic disparities in Europe. Norway contributes to these efforts through the EEA and Norway Grants. Another goal is to strengthen bilateral relations between Norway and the beneficiary states.

The EEA and Norway Grants are an important tool for addressing common challenges and strengthening our European community based on democratic values and principles of good governance. Cooperation between donor and beneficiary states is key to creating platforms for political interaction, cooperation in priority areas and network-building. The Grants are allocated in response to the specific needs of each beneficiary state, and to sectors where there is potential for, and interest in, cooperation with
